New Vice chair was voted on in the sectional meeting and Matt Vanos was voted in to replace Robert Gray. Robert has decided to step down to give a younger generation a chance to grow in our organization. Cory Gray is now the contractors representative for Manitoba.

Michael MacDonald is our new Atlantic province contractor representative for this area of Canada.

The Manufacturers and Distributors sectional meetings was also well attended and of course material delivers, freight and upcoming projects were discussed along with shortage of manpower and working from home.

NAIT's Insulator Program is continuing to champion student success that is relevant and responsive to the needs of industry.

NAIT is continuing to run hybrid courses allowing students the flexibility to learn from home while still gaining hand skills and training in a shop setting. Our classes have remained single classes throughout the year, but we are maintaining open slots to allow for more classes if we get student numbers for a waiting list. Apprentice numbers are still down as we are finishing up a 3rd year class next week with 17 students and in our next 2nd year class starting May 6th, we have 5 registered in it.

NAIT has chosen 3 of our students to participate in skills this year and we are eager to let them loose to showcase their abilities to the rest of the participants! The fall class is September 3rd, and it will be a 1st year class to jump start the season followed by a 3rd, 2nd, 3rd, and a 2nd. Our instructors are still working on Note Package material, always fine tuning lesson plans for virtual class along with looking to move forward on the nest steps of the harmonization process for the insulator trade with a targeted implementation date of August 1, 2025.

The NAIT Insulator Program is still open for business for visits from Industry as well as Asbestos Removal courses continue to be offered at NAIT either through Continuing Education or Corporate and International Training. If you have any questions regarding Asbestos Removal courses or our Apprenticeship Program, we would be happy to answer them!

NAIT Insulator program staff are always looking for opportunities to visit Industry and to tour facilities to see what new technology and advanced practices you are incorporating into your projects. LABOUR REPORT

As the second quarter of 2024 is almost complete, open shop Contractors continue to see a lack of skilled labour resources able to contribute to their projects in Western Canada. As a result, hiring incentives have been passed onto the end user in the form of Project specific compensation mechanisms, such as, but not necessarily limited to, wage uplifts, additional travel time benefits, as well as safety and retention programs, for the direct labour force, in an effort, to attract talent to their Projects. As Employers continue to navigate the shortage of skilled labour, prices to perform the work are expected to continue to increase. In all likelihood, many will not be able to support certain projects and temporary foreign workers will become the reality to help some of the larger Projects over the finish line. One Project in particular absorbing much of the insulation talent from Alberta, is LNG Canada in Kitimat, British Columbia. The current Phase of this Project is almost completed mechanically, however with the bulk of insulation application being cold work and cryogenic, there are continued attempts to attract qualified Insulators from all over the Country so they can commission by desired deadlines. It will be interesting to see over the course of 2024 how employers and end users collaborate and continue to navigate the shortage of skilled labour.

Member Insulator Scholarships

The Thermal Insulation Association of Alberta has a member scholarship program in place designed to recognize and support those first, second and third year apprenticeship students employed by current TIAA member companies. In recognition of the hard work undertaken by the students in the NAIT and SAIT Thermal Insulator Apprenticeship Program and in order to help them achieve their maximum potential without being hindered by financial hardships, TIAA offers a number of scholarships every year, ranging from \$1,200 to \$2,000.

DEADLINE & ELIGIBILITY

Scholarship applications are accepted for review by the scholarship committee based on submissions received by March 31, July 31 and November 30 and applications must be submitted within 6 months of students finishing their last course.

Some of the other eligibility criteria is as follows and is subject to change at any time.

Applicants must:

- Be a Canadian and an Alberta resident.
- Be a registered Alberta apprentice in the Insulator trade who is or was employed by a contractor member of TIAA during, or just prior to their apprenticeship training period.
- Have completed their first, second or third year period of technical training, and be registered in the next period of technical training.
- Demonstrate their financial need.
- Submit a 100-word summary along with any other requirements on the application form.
- Have their employer complete the Employer Recommendation and Certification as outlined in the application.
- Submit a NAIT/SAIT transcript of marks or copy of government confirmation letter of marks that is sent to all apprentices upon completing a technical training term.
