NAIT's Insulator Program is continuing to champion student success that is relevant and responsive to the needs of industry.

NAIT is continuing to run hybrid courses allowing students the flexibility to learn from home while still gaining hand skills and training in a shop setting.

NAIT's Insulator Program is seeing its highest student numbers in 5 years with this year having a fill rate of 81.7%.

We will be starting the year off with the 2nd year on September 2nd and then the 3rd year on October 27th both being based on the old curriculum of 7 weeks.

Starting in January we will be starting our new curriculum changes to a 4-year period, beginning with 1st Jan 5, 1st again March 2 and finishing with 2nd May 4th.

NAIT has room for double classes if needed to match student demands along the way. We had a posting out for an instructor position, and we welcomed Lindsay Davis to our team along with her extensive commercial and OH&S experience to our small team bringing our numbers back up to 4.

The NAIT staff are busy developing new course material for the transition to a 4-year program along with test banks and lesson plans to allow us to make a seamless transition to the new curriculum placement in January.

NAIT had 3 students that participated in Skill's this year and all 3-attaining 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.

The NAIT Insulator Program is still open for business for visits from Industry as well as Asbestos Removal courses continue to be offered at NAIT either through Continuing Education or Corporate and International Training. If you have any questions regarding Asbestos Removal courses or our Apprenticeship Program, we would be happy to answer them!

NAIT Insulator program staff are always looking for opportunities to visit Industry and to tour facilities to see what new technology and advanced practices you are incorporating into your projects. We are always on the lookout for pictures of workmanship and projects to showcase to our students and to incorporate into our curriculum. The NAIT Insulator Program has an open-door policy for visitors that would like to view our shop and projects, and the coffee is always on! Thank you for your continued support!

## SAIT TRAINING REPORT

"The 2024/25 academic year began at a slower pace but has since experienced significant growth. This momentum led to the decision to add extra cohorts this year. We are currently running a second first-year cohort, and plans are underway to introduce additional second- and third-year cohorts in Fall 2025/26. These new cohorts are already 50% full, despite registration only opening in mid-May—an encouraging sign of the programs turnaround and growing demand.

In response to the evolving needs of our students and the introduction of a redesigned curriculum, SAIT will be enhancing its shop space to support the innovative learning models of the new four-year program set to launch in January 2026.

The students and faculty at SAIT would like to extend their sincere thanks to TIAA, and in particular to Kyle Sippola and Kelly Archuleta, for visiting SAIT, engaging with our third-year students, and helping distribute TIAA-sponsored hoodies during the Dean's Award Breakfast. This year's award recipient, Rhenjo James Visto, was recognized for his outstanding work ethic and perseverance throughout his three years in the program.

With continued support from TIAA and its members, SAIT is excited to further grow and modernize the Insulator Program to meet the needs of the future."

# INNOVATORS

The Innovators Committee remains focused on initiatives that bring value to the association and its members. Below is an overview of our key updates and areas of progress over the past few months.

## **ENBIX Collaboration & Engagement**

Just over a year ago, the Emissions Neutral Buildings Information Exchange (ENBIX) was launched as a collaborative initiative of the Alberta Ecotrust Foundation. Its goal is to accelerate the transition to an emissions-neutral built environment by connecting industry professionals, government officials, and key stakeholders across Alberta.

Since its launch, ENBIX has become a growing hub for knowledge-sharing and collaboration in the building industry—particularly in the residential and commercial sectors. Through events, webinars, and workshops on topics such as low-carbon building materials, retrofit projects, and decarbonizing construction, ENBIX continues to engage builders, developers, architects, and owners across the province.

While mechanical insulation is not currently a core focus for ENBIX, their platform presents a valuable opportunity for TIAA to increase industry awareness around the role insulation plays in energy efficiency and emissions reduction. We are on ENBIX's communications list and have attended several of their events to stay connected.

## **DEADLINE & ELIGIBILITY**

Scholarship applications are accepted for review by the scholarship committee based on submissions received by March 31, July 31 and November 30 and applications must be submitted within 6 months of students finishing their last course.

Some of the other eligibility criteria is as follows and is subject to change at any time.

Applicants must:

- Be a Canadian and an Alberta resident.
- Be a registered Alberta apprentice in the Insulator trade who is or was employed by a contractor member of TIAA during, or just prior to their apprenticeship training period.
- Have completed their first, second or third year period of technical training, and be registered in the next period of technical training.
- Demonstrate their financial need.
- Submit a 100-word summary along with any other requirements on the application form.
- Have their employer complete the Employer Recommendation and Certification as outlined in the application.
- Submit a NAIT/SAIT transcript of marks or copy of government confirmation letter of marks that is sent to all apprentices upon completing a technical training term.
